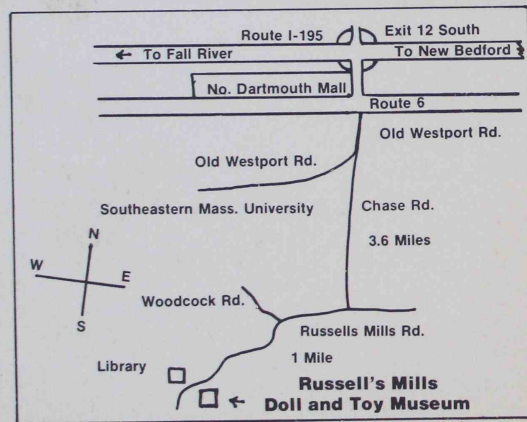

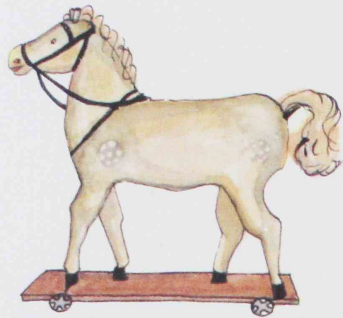

The tiny village of Russell's Mills in Dartmouth, Mass., has become the permanent home of an exquisite, private collection of antique dolls and toys. Open to the public from May through October, the Russell's Mills Doll and Toy Museum is a treat for doll collectors and an experience for antique lovers.

The Museum invites adults and children into a world of Victorian fashion, a time when the creation of playthings was a work of art.

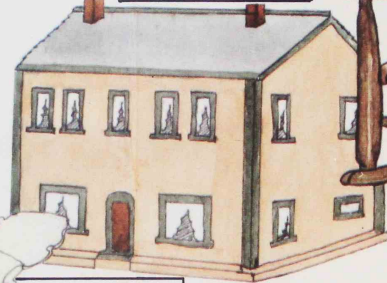
Georgia Codin, founder and curator of the Museum, has carefully accumulated this fine array of dolls over the past 30 years. Her collection includes the work of such famous designers as Jumeau, Bru, Steiner, Kestner, Izannah Walker, Joel Ellis, and Shoenhut.



An afternoon's visit to the Museum is a journey into a rich past, guaranteed to call up memories from an older generation as well as entice curious appreciation from its children and grandchildren. Mrs. Codin's extensive knowledge of the history of dolls contributes to the experience. A gift shop is available and features hand crafted miniatures and souvenirs. The Russell's Mills Doll and Toy Museum offers free admission and free doll appraisals to its members.

Toys from the turn of the century, a unique collection of miniatures, and lovingly furnished doll houses are also on display in the light and airy gallery.

The Russell's Mills Doll and Toy Museum is housed in a beautifully restored, historic, 19th century village church, the 2nd Congregational Church, built in 1824. The building has also been the home of a popular puppet theatre, and for nearly 30 years, the Dartmouth Children's Museum.
